He purchased his first car, a 1951 Hudson in 1980 while attending the National Car Show in Hershey, Pa. Sam McKinney was with him and drove the car home After they were out on the road, they realized that the car had no brakes. They used the emergency brake to get home. His second car was the Nash that has become his favorite. He purchased it from Dr. Anderson from Hohenwald, Tenn.
